## OJEN's March 2021 Twitter Moot Committee Guide

### What is a Twitter Moot?

The OJEN Twitter Moot is an online debate. Students from across Ontario participate in the discussion by tweeting their opinions either individually or in teams/classes. The [OJEN committee in Hamilton](#) came up with this fun and engaging justice education initiative for Hamilton-area schools a few years ago. This fall, for the first time, OJEN will run the program for high school students throughout Ontario.

The Twitter Moot offers students a great opportunity to learn about an important and contentious legal issue. This year, the OJEN Twitter Moot will take place during Ontario's Access to Justice Week. On **March 10<sup>th</sup>, from 9 am to 5 pm**, Ontario students will debate:

### **Does a law requiring mandatory vaccinations violate the *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms?***

### How can OJEN committees participate?

Local committees can support the program by **promoting and engaging with tweets** from students in their region. To do this, committees will need to use or create their own Twitter account, and [OJEN's communication team can help](#) with this. Just send us an email at [regions@ojen.ca](mailto:regions@ojen.ca).

We ask that all committee's use the following formula when creating a new Twitter account: **@OJEN\_committee name**.

For example, the Kingston committee's Twitter handle would be @OJEN\_Kingston

If you are new to Twitter, we have created a [Twitter Basics](#) participant handout for people participating in the Twitter Moot.

Teachers must register their students for participation in the Twitter Moot and provide us with all Twitter handles that their students will be using. OJEN staff will only retweet and recognize twitter handles that are provided to us by a teacher. On the day of the Twitter Moot, in addition to retweeting some of the best arguments and exchanges, OJEN staff will direct tweets from students to their local committee.

Committees are not obliged to participate in this province-wide Twitter Moot, but should you choose to do so, we recommend designating a committee member who will monitor the committee's twitter account on the day of the moot. You can also follow the Twitter Moot hashtag **#OJENTMVAX** throughout the day and interact with any of the students tweeting in the debate, by liking, replying and retweeting students' arguments.

## Sample tweet

Mandatory vaccination violates the right to security of the person because it undermines bodily integrity #OJENTMVAX @OJEN\_ROEJ

*#OJENTMVAX identifies that this tweet is part of the Twitter Moot  
Mentioning @OJEN\_ROEJ allows OJEN staff to retweet and forward tweets to local committees*

If this tweet came from a contributor in the Halton region, OJEN would retweet it and mention the Halton OJEN Committee by adding its twitter handle (@OJEN\_Halton). This tweet from a Halton student would then show up in the feed of the Halton committee's Twitter account.

On **March 12<sup>th</sup>**, OJEN will select two winners, one based on the most persuasive tweet and the other based on overall contribution.

## Additional engagement options for committees

If your committee wishes to be involved more extensively, please consider the following:

- Help us recruit legal volunteers to provide “virtual coaching” to participants by discussing the issues around peremptory challenges. Depending on teacher interest, we may need to set up virtual guest speaking engagements in high school law classes, or connect teachers with lawyers who can answer students’ questions about the use of peremptory challenges. Whenever possible, we would prefer to connect teachers to lawyers in their local community.
- Encourage local stakeholders, like law firms and community organizations, to follow and provide encouragement to participants via their own Twitter accounts
- Consider running your own local version of the Twitter Moot this spring. Historically, the Hamilton committee runs their Twitter Moot for Law Day in April. Check out the provincial Twitter Moot this fall and let us know whether your committee is interested in running its own Twitter Moot in the future. We can work together with committees wishing to run their own version of this program locally.
