SECTION 24(2) OF THE CHARTER – EXCLUSION OF EVIDENCE

Learning Objectives

- To develop students' knowledge of section 24(2) of the *Charter*, including the legal test used to determine whether or not evidence obtained through a *Charter* breach should be excluded.
- To develop legal reasoning skills by having students apply legal concepts and tests to case studies.

Materials

- Copies of the case study, R v AM (one per person)
- Copies of the student handout, *Exclusion of Evidence* (one per person)
- Copies of the student handout, *Applying the Grant Test* (one per person)
- Copies of OJEN resource, In Brief: Section 8 of the Charter – the Right to be Secure Against Unreasonable Search and Seizure (optional)

Teaching and Learning Strategies

- 1. Activate students' knowledge of the topic by having them consider the case study of *R v AM*. Once students have reviewed the facts of the case discuss whether they think the evidence should have been excluded and why, and what factors they based their decision on.
- 2. Have students review the handout, *Exclusion of Evidence*, and discuss the related questions. After each section, clarify any points and check for understanding. Remind students that it is a balancing process to determine whether or not to exclude evidence that was obtained in breach of an individual's *Charter* rights. The court must assess the effect of admitting evidence on society's confidence in the justice system.

- **3.** Provide students with the first two pages of the *Applying the Grant Test* handout (i.e. the facts and the Grant test flow chart). Have students read the facts of *R v Harrison* and use the chart to apply the *Grant* test to the case. Have a discussion about how students would rule on each ground of the test.
- **4.** Distribute the remainder of the *Applying the Grant Test* handout (i.e. the decision and discussion questions). Have students review the decision made by the SCC and discuss how their rulings compared to the actual ruling in the case.
- **5.** Have students either discuss or provide written responses to one or more of the discussion questions. Debrief as a class, particularly with respect to the different decisions made in *R v Grant* and *R v Harrison*.

Extension

Have students complete the OJEN resource, In Brief: Section 8 of the Charter – the Right to be Secure Against Unreasonable Search and Seizure.
